News and Notes from the Superintendent...Donna P. Leake

It's budget season! By the time you are reading this the BOE will be actively engaged in formulating the 2023-24 school budget. On behalf of the administration and staff, at the January 12 BOE meeting I presented a 2023-24 school budget proposal to the BOE. The 9.98% increase in the proposed budget is driven by increases in many non-negotiable costs, including salaries, benefits, tuitions, and utilities. This will not be an easy budget year. As discussed with the BOE. the proposed budget does not include any "new nice to have". It does, however, include cost estimates that could put us at risk with our "need to have". Final BOE approval is anticipated to take place at its meeting on February 9. At the January meeting, the BOE also: approved several new policy revisions and repeals; discussed the timeline for the Ethel Cushing Gardner Music Scholarship (Hartford Foundation); reviewed the draft 2023-24 School Calendar for possible approv al at its meeting in February; approved the 2023 BOE Long-Term Capital Improvement Plan for submission to the Town.All these documents are available for review in the Board of Ed section of the Eastford School webpage www.eastfordct.org.In closing, I thank the community of Eastford for its continued support. I encourage all members of the community to become engaged in the budget process. We remain open to receiving your thoughts and suggestions for moving our school district forward in a positive direction.

#### Selectman's Summary by Deb Richards, Firet Selectman/EMD

January is the beginning of planning for the next fiscal year. Budgets will be received by the Board of Selectmen and we will begin to set the basis for finances in 2023-2024. The Board of Selectmen's goal is prudent budgeting while maintaining services and assuring the wellbeing of the residents in town. Inflationary costs hit our budget as soon as it was passed last July. As everyone is aware from their own lives, the cost of all goods and services increased at exponential rates. Even with the money set aside in a fuel contingency fund, our costs are expected to exceed budgeted amounts. Insurance, tipping and hauling, supplies, the cost of electricity, maintenance and repairs for equipment, (if the parts are even available!) while state and federal funding is lower than past years. This is the year for Eastford's mandatory revaluation. Real estate will be evaluated to reflect today's market value. This will most likely be higher than in the past, especially if figured at the current mil rate. The tax bills are not due until July and prior to these bills being issued, the Board of Selectmen will bring the new budget to the town for a vote offering a mil rate adjustment to offset the revaluation. Please direct questions you might have to our assessor's office. New staff have been hired to assist PW with snow plowing and to check permits at the transfer station. Preliminary grant applications have been filed for the replacement of two bridges, Ashford Road over Bigelow Brook and Old Colony over Bungee Brook. 80/20 split, federal and state with no cost to Eastford. We all keep moving forward – together.

The "Eastford Greenup Day" group met to make plans for the townwide greenup event in April which

includes a meal and time spent with neighbors in the fresh outdoor air. This event has the dual benefits of getting exercise walking the picturesque roads of Eastford while picking up recyclables and trash littering our roads.

In the past this has been a very well attended event that has enjoyed the support of the Eastford Conservation and Historic Preservation





1806 Union Society Building Committee Report by Carol Davidge, Chair Thanks to Lauren Anderson, Dorothy Nieminen Bressette, Charlie Demerest, and Barbara Nieminen Urban for helping to identify folks who, in 1957, gathered at the 1806 Union Society Building for Christmas events (photo below). Thank you too to those who recently donated to assist in the preservation of this important building where, over 200 years, rural children learned to read, the group helped found & fund the Eastford Fire Co, sponsored 4H & Boy Scouts, held gatherings for mostly poor immigrant families in the Phoenixville section of Eastford, and welcomed all regardless of ethnic origin, spiritual belief, age or gender. Thank you recent donors: Lauren Anderson, Janet Bellamy, Art Brodeur, Betsy Di-Quattro, Mary Ellen & Mike Ellsworth, Tom Hughes & Andrea Amato Hughes, & Barbara Urban. This building is listed on the National Register of Historic Places because of its role in rural community life. New addition to its history is from Charlie Demerest who recalls that his 8th Grade EES class held a dance at the Union Society Building around 1965 or 1966. Individuals identified in the photo include: Milton, Elsie, Jeffrey, Jennifer, and Charlie Demerest; William, Helena and Dorothy Nieminen; Linda King. Eastford Independent Fire Co.No. 1 Report by Jeannine Spink, Volunteer Contributor

2022 has come and gone. The EIFC wishes Eastford residents a prosperous and healthy 2023. Life has a way of getting in the way, but the citizens of Eastford can be assured we will be there to assist you with your emergency needs.

Welcome to probationary member Jonathan Lynch to our ranks. The EIFC responded to 17 "911" s in December.

Annually, in January, the Company generates a detailed report on the number of calls and types for the previous year. In 2022, we responded to 177 "911" calls. The towns' residents need to be informed of the work their tax dollars are doing. Breakdowns for calls and drills are below:

EMS: 103 – Medicals, excluding vehicle accidents with injury Central Station, malicious false alarm, detector malfunction: 15

Motor Vehicle: 14 - With and without injury

Fires: 12 - Structure, chimney, vehicle, brush/forest/wildland, grass

Power Lines Down: 12

Lift Assist/Good Intent/Service Call: 8

Miscellaneous Fires: 5 - Smoke, trash, recreational vehicle, outside

storage, combustible/flammable

Carbon Monoxide: No symptoms-1 / Symptoms-4

Search for Person, calls cancelled enroute, authorized burning: 3

Fire and EMS drills are held every Wednesday night for the following skills: Fire: Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) x 2, ladders, hose and pump operations and testing, truck checks and inventory x 12, driver training, rescue jacks, RIT (Rapid Intervention Team) for search and rescue of fire personnel, mandatory Hazmat Awareness, chimney fires x 2 and Woodstock Dive Team. EMS drills/ classes: Mandatory Airborne/Bloodborne Pathogens, mandatory CPR/AED, patient assessment, documentation, splinting, presumption, extrication x 2, OB/GYN, backboards, spinal immobilization, EMT/EMR initial and refresher classes, mandatory N95 mask fit testing, ice rescue, carbon monoxide poisoning, and annual, mandatory physical examinations for all members. Membership meetings are scheduled the first Tuesday of each monthly, in addition to Line Officers x 12, quarterly Board of Directors, committees as needed, new member interviews and house and property maintenance.

Socially, the Company was very visible. We participated and/or sponsored: 80<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration of incorporation, install/ remove flags at Grove Cemetery, Memorial Day Parade, Chaplin Parade, Silas Run, Xmas in July at Charlie Brown and Peppertree Campgrounds, Touch-a-Truck at Eastford Public Library, Trunk-Or-Treat at Buell's Orchard and EES, Santa's escort around town, Fire Prevention at EES and tour of the firehouse for students. Thanks to residents of Eastford who make very generous donations regularly to keep our Company at the level of EMS and fire suppression we have aspired to since 1942. 
