



ID YOU KNOW? Eastford Historical Society

Did you know that the first cottage on Crystal Pond was built in 1911?



Charles D. Tatem purchased an acre of land on the south shore of Crystal Pond in 1910. One year later his father, John M. Tatem, purchased two adjacent acres from the same landowners Charles and Marie Broomfield. Charles, along with his father and two brothers Carlton and Harry, were the owners of the J.M. Handle Company in Eastford. The company produced wooden handles for tools such as hammers, picks, axes, sledges, rakes, and a textile loom part called a picker stick. At one time they even produced baseball bats. As a salesman for the family business Charles spent many hours away from home traveling to build the mill's customer base. He covered a very large territory that included New England, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Virginia, the Canadian Maritime, and Ontario. He built his cottage as a place to relax with his wife Jennie and daughter Catherine after long hours away from home. He named the cottage Miramichi after a lumber port town on the northern shore of New Brunswick. Miramichi is a native American name meaning "Happy Place by the Sea". Sadly, in 1940 Charles, the oldest of the three brothers, passed away very suddenly while on a business trip. He was only 58 years old. The cottage that he built stands today on property belonging to his grandson, Charles French.



JANE & LORING WHITE PUT EASTFORD BIRDS ON WORLD SITE



In 1985, Jane White saw a notice from Cornell University asking people to record all species of birds that they saw at their feeders. "It sounded like fun," says Jane. Since then, every year from November to April, on two consecutive days each week, Jane and Loring have watched throughout the days, filled out tally sheets, and entered their list of species in Cornell's international data base. The rarest birds that they have seen in their yard over these years are Connecticut's endangered Red Headed Woodpecker and a Dickcissel. To prove such sightings, Loring takes photographs. In one February 2023 week, Jane and Loring recorded 18 species at their feeders, noticing that Red-Winged Blackbirds had returned early but that the Carolina Wren was missing. They also list species for the Great Backyard Bird Count. These sweethearts have been married 69 years. Jane was born at 1935 in Marlboro, MA and grew up watching birds at her family's rural home. Loring was born in Sutton. MA in 1934. They met through church activities, and married and settled in Putnam in 1954. In 1962, they moved to Eastford to be close to Eastford Baptist Church. Loring worked at Pratt and Whitney while they raised their family. In 1964, Jane became Eastford Baptist Church's organist. She also played piano for EES concerts, Memorial Day and Heritage Day, taught piano lessons, and held recitals for her students. She retired as church organist in 2021 after 57 years. Jane's music at Eastford Baptist Church will be celebrated on July 11. Jane and Loring have three children, 8 grandchildren, and 6 great-grand children and continue to watch and feed birds in their yard. "When Loring goes out to fill the feeders, the birds swarm around him," says Jane, who writes with pen on a tally sheet, and later goes to the computer to send the results to Cornell.





LEGAL NOTICE TOWN OF EASTFORD

The Town of Eastford having legally voted to lay a tax rate of 27.50 mills on the Grand List of October 1, 2022 hereby warns those persons liable for taxes to said town that said taxes become due and payable on July 1, 2023. All Motor Vehicle taxes; and all other taxes of One Hundred Dollars or less are payable in one installment, on or before August 1, 2023. August 1, 2023 postmarks are accepted as being on time. All other taxes may be paid in two installments, the second installment becoming due on January 1, 2024. OFFICE HOURS:

Tuesday & Wednesday,10:a.m. to Noon & 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. 2^{nd} & 4^{th} Tuesday of every month, Open until 6:30 p.m.

Interest will be charged from due date on any tax or part thereof not paid on or before August 1, 2023 at a rate of 1.5% per month from due date of July 1, 2023. Minimum penalty is \$2.00. All Motor Vehicle taxes not paid by August 1, 2023 will be reported as delinquent to the Department of Motor Vehicles and registrations will be denied.

If you receive a tax bill from a town you did not reside in on October 1, 2022, please contact the assessor. If you do not receive a tax bill for your real estate, motor vehicle or personal property please contact my office at (860) 974-1885 Ext. 6 for a duplicate bill. Per Connecticut General Statutes, failure to receive a bill does not relieve you of obligation to pay any tax or interest that is due.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS: LICENSES MUST BE OBTAINED DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE

All dog licenses may be obtained through the mail or at the Town Clerk's Office during regular office hours. Please send or bring a copy of your dog's rabies vaccine certificate and proof of spay/neuter from your veterinarian, cash or a check made out to the Eastford Town Clerk and a return stamped envelope if obtaining via mail.

Town Clerk Office hours:

Tuesday and Wednesday 10-12 and 1-4. Open the 2nd and 4th Tuesday until 6:30 PM Each owner or keeper of a dog of the age of six months or older, except dogs kept under a kennel, shall cause such dog to be licensed in the Town Clerk's Office in the town where such dog is kept, ON OR BEFORE JUNE 30th ANNUALLY, or at such time as such dog becomes six months old, and annually thereafter, on or before June 30th. Any owner or keeper applying for a license for a dog shall submit to the town clerk a RÁBIES CERTIFICATE signed by a veterinarian, or a copy thereof, stating that such dog has been vaccinated against rabies, the date of the vaccination and the duration of the immunity provided by the vaccine. No license shall be issued unless the certificate indicates that the immunity provided by the vaccine is effective at the time of licensing. Proof of spay or neuter is required in the form of a veterinarian's certificate. Kennel licenses also need to be obtained or renewed in the month of June. FEES:

The month of May and the beginning of June was especially busy. In addition to our regularly scheduled meetings and drills, the Company had a "spruce-up" day of cleaning, painting, and planting the flower bed. Drills were pumping, patient care, vital signs, moving skills and accident reconstruction.

A major drill was a live burn drill at the Fire Training Tower in Dayville. The purpose of the Fire Training Tower drill held with mutual aid companies, on May 7th, was to have live simulations with hands-on fire training, and fire safety. Fire departments, along with their aid companies, on May 7th, was to have live simulations with hands-on fire training, and fire safety. Fire departments, along with their EMS and rehab, can practice the following safety protocols in order to help reduce the number of injuries and deaths of fire fighters and civilians, reduce property damage, increase fire department efficiency, morale and confidence, improve knowledge and skill capabilities.

On May 17th, members of the Eastford, Ashford, Woodstock and Union Volunteer Fire Departments were invited to Station 71, to participate in a lecture and visuals regarding serious injury and/or fatal injury at collision scenes. Detective Gregory Trahan, CSP, Traffic Services Unit, Collision Analysis and Reconstruction Squad, highlighting points that the collision investigators request of our departments prior to and at the time of their arrival. Preparation by the departments will help them to expedite the roadway, create a detailed description of the incident, with clearance of the scene time shortened.

The EIFC responded to 17 calls in May, 2023.
On May 24th, members installed 68 fire department flags at the Grove Cemetery, 3 at the Elm Street Cemetery in Southbridge, and 2 in the St. Philips Cemetery in Ashford. Flags will remain in place until Veterans Day.

May 29th was the town celebration for Memorial Day Parade. Members, along with the EIFC fleet of apparatus participated.

The EIFC is entering its 81st year of providing fire and medical emergency service to the town. The mantra of the volunteer fire service has always been "to care for our fellow man and give of ourselves first and not for personal gain or satisfaction. On June 6th, the Company celebrated its annual dinner and election of officers for 2023 – 2025. One commemoration was the annual "Memorial Table" honoring those members who passed the previous year and those before. Without the commitment of our former and deceased members, the EIFC would not be at the level we are today. Service pins were awarded to the following: 5 years - EMS Lieutenant Steve Kitson and member Zac Bertram. 15 years – Fire Captain Nate Fabian and member Matt Yakis.
