And, most particularly applause and kudos to Terry Cote, of the Board of Selectmen, whose energy and sense of mission and perspicacity brought the entire endeavor to fruition.

The Eastford Food Pantry is a stellar example of people helping people, of Eastford residents giving of themselves to help others in Town. The Food Pantry is now well-stocked thanks to the efforts of Karen and Steve Broderick, those anonymous donors who gave generously to the Pantry over the holidays, and to all who, on a continual basis, bring food and other essentials to the Town Office Building to be added to the Pantry's shelves. I most specifically want to thank Karen and Steve for their selflessness in expending much time and effort in organizing foodstuffs et al., for delivering them to those in need, and for general oversight and management of the Town's efforts to aid those in need. I am particularly proud to commend the students at the Eastford Elementary School for their successful and heartwarming charity project during December. Eighth grade students, and their adviser, Melissa Brown, facilitated the successful drive and they collected 1,640 items—toiletries, paper goods, boxes of cereal, canned goods, and protein-based foods. It was an emotional moment when they turned over the donated goods to the Brodericks. There were so many items that, for a time, there was a storage problem in the Town Office Building, But thanks to the efforts of Public Works Supervisor Ben Schmidt and the Surplus folks at the University of Connecticut, more space was cleared and more shelving added. So, to all of you students at the School, we thank you and we particularly congratulate those of you in Kindergarten who, spurred on by the incentive of a pizza party at drive's end, brought in the most items. Let youth be served, and they serve us well. They are our heritage and it seems to be in good hands.

And speaking of Heritage [how's that for artificially crafting your own transition to the next item] the Board of Selectmen has set Saturday, June 14, as Heritage Day 2014. This Day, resplendent with activities, is a highlight of the Town's year. Volunteers are needed to aug-

ment the hearty crew which each year makes Heritage Day more creative and more impressive. Contact the Selectmen's Office at 860-974-0133, ext.3 to volunteer.

At its meeting on January 6, the Board of Selectmen accepted the report of the Town's Auditors for the year ended June 30, 2013. The Auditors, MAWC Certified Public Accountants and Consultants, gave the Town a very positive report with only two material weaknesses which were, in fact, addressed and corrected prior to the issuance of the final audit through development of an Accounting Manual and through segregation of duties over tax collections between the Tax Collector and the Finance staff.. The Auditors found the Town of Eastford to be in a strong liquidity position, and gave it an unqualified rating, a clean audit.

I learned during a professional life of more than 50 years in communications/public relations/advertising that one of the tenets of a good publicity campaign was to take down your signs shortly after the conclusion of the event. Too often around Town, folks will put up signs or placards for yard sales and such and not remove them, leaving them to linger, deteriorate, and become less-than-aesthetic clutter. So, I ask you: if you put 'em up, take 'em down—with alacrity.

I want to alert you once again to the availability of public transportation to the Town of Eastford through the Northeastern Connecticut Transit District [NECTD] operated by the Northeastern Connecticut Council of Governments of which Eastford is a member. The District provides two types of service: a so-called Deviated Fixed Route Service which operates Monday-Sunday with various scheduled stops located throughout the service area and the Elderly and Disabled Service which provides doorto-door service and is also available seven days per week by reservation with NECTD. Getting Serious About Sirius

Feeling at home in the night sky can seem daunting but a good beginning is to learn to recognize just one star. That star will lead to other stars and, eventually, to an enjoyable recognition that the night sky is a friendly and familiar place.


What star should be the first one? The clear choice is Sirius, the Dog Star. It is the brightest star visible from Earth. Only the Sun, Moon, and planets like Venus and Jupiter are brighter than this star. During February, just look South about one-third of the way above the horizon. Sirius is so bright because it is one of the stars closest to the Earth (about nine light years away) and because it has a hot surface temperature (about 10,000°C compared to the Sun's 6,000°C). Sirius is the main (alpha) star in the constellation known as the Big Dog (Canis major). This faithful hunting dog is right behind Orion as he faces the enraged and charging bull, Taurus.

This bright star was well known by our ancestors and, curiously, ancient cultures always connected it to the figure of a dog or similar wolf-like creatures. The Romans and Greeks observed that Sirius rose with the Sun in late summer and concluded that was why July and August would be so hot. In fact, Sirius is the Greek word for "scorching" and the expression, "the dog days of summer," derives from this ancient belief that the combined influence of the Sun and the scorching Dog Star made summer so hot.

Early Egyptians also paid special attention to Sirius.

Some temples were built so that the light from this rising star could shine into them. Egyptian astronomers observed that the annual flooding of the Nile River – an event important to their agricultural society – began when Sirius was the last star visible on the horizon, just before dawn. This information was given to the Pharaohs but members of the working classes would not have had such knowledge. Thus, to their subjects, the Pharaohs must have seemed all-knowing and able to command the annual flooding of Egypt's mighty river. So Sirius is not only an object of brilliant beauty but also a tangible reminder that our ancestors paid careful attention to the stars and that virtually all ancient cultures believed that the stars influenced human affairs.

This month's full moon will be timely for romance because it occurs on Valentine's Day. Some Native American tribes called the February full moon the "Full Snow Moon" because heavy snows could be expected during this month. Similarly, because hunting was likely to be more difficult and less successful in deep snow, sometimes Native Americans called it the "Full Hunger Moon."

Report of the Eastford School Scholarship Committee

This month we continue profiling those in whose names the various scholarships and awards presented to Eastford students are given.


The Mary King Sharpe Memorial Business Scholarship. Mary King Sharpe grew up in Eastford, the daughter of Frank and Ana King. The family farm was located on the top of School House Hill. Mary was one of seven children: Hattie, Edith, Frank, Fritz, Walter, and Otto. Otto was Eastford's First Selectman for many years. When it was time to go to high school she chose to go to Putnam High, an option for Eastford students at the time. After graduating from Putnam, she went to work alongside her sister Edith at Medbury and Trowbridge, a Putnam construction company. She later married Richard Sharpe from Pomfret. The Business Scholarship was established after her passing and is given to a student who wishes to study Business at a two- or four-year school.

The Harold Carpenter Fund Scholarship. Harold David Carpenter was born in Eastford on June 4, 1904, the second of four children of Orlo and Mary Lawson Carpenter. On April 13, 1941 he married Leila Jones from Vian, Oklahoma, and they raised two children on the family farm at 333 Old Colony Road. The farm was noted for the Devon cattle he raised there. Mr. Carpenter was active in Town affairs and had a wealth of knowledge which he was always willing to share. An avid supporter of local history, he contributed a supplement to Diane Maher Cameron's Eastford, The Biography of a New England Town, published in 1976 by the Eastford Historical Society. In the supplement, he shares many memories of Eastford history, and its particular strength is that it is very first-hand information inasmuch as he was related to many of the families which had been in Eastford for generations—Bowen, Bosworth, Buell to name a few. He also made oral history tapes of his recollections which are in The Eastford Historical Society collection. Harold Carpenter died on October 4, 1977 while doing something he loved—working in the woods of Eastford. The Scholarship Fund was established after his death by the Historical Society. The Scholarship is for post-secondary education with special consideration given to candidates showing scholastic ability, quality of

character, and the need for financial assistance.

The Eleanor K. Lewis Scholarship. Eleanor Keith Lewis was born in Eastford in 1895, the daughter of Arthur and Lillian Keith. She grew up in Eastford, attended the Eastford Grammar School, and went on to Woodstock Academy, graduating in 1913. She became a teacher and took her first teaching position at the Phoenixville School. She served the Town of Eastford for 34 years as teacher and principal. Many of her former students still live in Eastford, among them her granddaughter, Scholarship Committee member Nancy Eleanor Lewis Mayhew. Mrs. Lewis and her husband, M. Darwin Lewis, lived for many vears in the North Ashford section of Eastford in the old tavern where the Still River Café was recently in operation. They eventually moved "downtown" to be near her mother. The Lewises had one son, M. Keith Lewis, and three granddaughters. She was very active in Town, serving in 1947 as general chairman of Eastford's Centennial Celebration. She was the organist at the Eastford Congregational Church and an active member of the Betty Putnam Chapter of the Eastern Star. In 1954, after her passing, a committee was formed to establish a memorial fund the interest of which was to be used for an Eastford student graduating from secondary school. The scholarship has been awarded each year since 1956 and as contributions have grown over the years the award has increased in value.

Now comes the commercial: Giving our young people an opportunity to further their education and to continue to grow academically and socially is a rare opportunity. 

The Planning Committee for The Day Camp at Crystal Pond met in early January. We are excited about our 11th Day Camp summer! This year's program will run for 5 weeks, from July 7th through August 8th. There will be 2 two-week sessions [July 7-18 & July 21-Aug 1], with the usual activities—Red Cross Swimming Lessons, Sports, Outdoor Adventure [fishing, boating hiking], Arts and Crafts—plus special programs presented by volunteers, including music, 19th-century history, fire department presentations, K-9 units, and special event days for the children—perhaps summer birthday day, hot dog roasts, parents' day. The 5th week, August 3-8, will be a theme week, and the children will choose Swimming, Sports, or Drama for their concentrations. We will aim for a maximum of 90 campers per week. Pre-K and Kindergarten children go for ½ day, and parents supply the children's transportation. The other campers, grades 1 through 8, can take bus transportation from the Woodstock and Eastford Elementary Schools. Their days run from 8:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. Students entering 9th grade are eligible to be counselors in Training [CITs].

Eastford Track and Field


The Eastford School Track and Field team has grown over the past seven years to become a fully participating team. It spans across four grades, offers 11 events for both boys and girls and is coached by both a head coach and assistant coach. These features make track and field a unique sport.

Track and field is considered a non- contact sport. Because of this, students in grade five are eligible to participate. By opening up the sport to fifth graders the team benefits in several ways. The size of the team grows so that as a school Eastford is able to participate in more events. The student athletes receive training earlier in their career as an athlete and are able to improve their performance in later years. Students who stick with track all four years while at Eastford Elementary develop a level of dedication and passion for the sport.

Track and field offers events in multiple areas. Track events include both sprinting and distant events. Sprinting events include the 100 and 200 meter dashes, and the 4 by 100 meter relay. Distant events include short distance of 400 meters and the 4 by 400 meter relay and longer distances of 800 and 1600 meters. Field events are separated into throwing and jumping events. Throwing events include the shot put and the discus. Jumping events include the high jump and the long jump. Overall, each athlete may compete in a total of four events which must be a combination of field and track events. For example, an athlete may compete in the 100, 200 and 4 by 100 and the high jump thus complying with a combination of mixed events.

Last year the number of track and field athletes increased to 34. At that time the administration approached the Eastford Board of Education for an assistant coach, which was approved. With two coaches and community volunteers, who are former athletes and/or coaches themselves, the track team members have received instruction and training in all events.

Enthusiasm for the sport continues to grow and Eastford Elementary School looks forward to continued participation and dedication to the sport.

Parents may request that the Board of Education pay tuition at another public high school, but in order to be considered, this request must be in writing to the Board of Education.

In addition to the registration form, the Readiness Council would be very grateful if parents of **children born** in 2010 or 2011 would fill out a Needs Assessment Form. The data collected from parents, even those who choose not to send their children to preschool, are important to the Readiness Council. The Needs Assessment Form will be mailed to families and can be found on the website. If you or somebody else has not received a Needs Assessment form in the mail, please call the school office (860-974-1130).

Kindergarten Registration

There is a registration form available in the school office and online for kindergarten. Children, who were born in 2009 or earlier, are eligible for kindergarten during the 2014-2015 school year. We will accept registration forms at any time. Students who are attending Eastford Elementary School's preschool do NOT have to re-register.

2013 has come to a close. It has been a very busy year for the EIFC. We wish Eastford residents health, happiness and prosperity.

Thank you to those who sent us donations following services provided to them throughout the year, and donations just to say "thanks".

We respond without hesitation to your emergency needs any time of the day or night, in good weather and bad. Your donations in support of the best fire and EMS services we can provide are greatly appreciated.

The company reached a record high 178 emergency calls in 2013:

-Medicals: 134:

(92 ambulance transports and 42 No Transports and Lift Assists)

-Motor Vehicle Accidents/Fires: 14 -Smoke/CO Investigations: 14 -Structure/Chimney Fires: 9

-Trees/Wires Down/Brush Fires: 7

Incorporated in the 178 calls, we responded 16 times mutual aid to the Ashford, Bungay, Pomfret, and Chaplin fire departments.

How have our calls increased? Reflecting back to history, yet only recorded since 1975:

-we responded 43 times in 1975,

-increasing to 96 in 1991,

-increasing to 140 in 2001 and

-increasing to 178 in 2013.

Each year as our call volume increases, so do demands of mandated skills' training / education, and maintenance of our vehicles and equipment to keep them "call ready" and maintenance of the house.

Average man-hours per month that each volunteer devotes to vehicles, meetings, drills, and house, in <u>addition</u> to "911" calls, is approximately 20.

Quick - Emergency Management Tips-

- 1. Have small bills on hand: ATM's & credit cards may not work during a disaster.
- 2. Keep copies of insurance policies, deeds & property records in a safe place (a safety deposit box) away from your home
- 3. Buy a weather radio w/ a hand crank & cell phone charger plug-in so you can charge both radio and cell phone if needed
- 4. If you take medicine or use a medical treatment, be sure you have what you need to make it on your own for at least a week
- 5. If your disaster plan involves flying by the seat of your pants, it's time to rethink: http://ready.gov/prepared2014
- 6. There is no substitute for running a live drill to practice your emergency plan. Practice makes perfect
- 7. Have a minimum of 5 days of food and water for each person (and pet) in your household. One gallon of water per person or pet per day.
- 8. Make sure your home's exhaust vents are clear of snow & ice to allow dangerous carbon monoxide to vent outside.

"The students support one another, knowing that they have a voice and are respected in the classroom." Catie speculates that this added confidence and comfort level may give students the self-assurance to raise their hand in class.

Catie attended The American Academy of Dramatic Arts in N.YC with the idea of becoming an actor. Then she met her husband, Ken. End of story. She loves being a wife to Ken and mom to Emma, age 10, and Kenny, age 8, and is happy and satisfied where her life has brought her. Catie is still acting—she had the lead role as Frances in "No Sex Please, We're British" at the Bradley Playhouse. In addition, Catie is the sole proprietor of her in-home care business. Ken (The Tile Guy) is gifted at creating tile rugs and laying tile in homes and businesses. When they're not working, she and Ken love spending time with their kids, playing board games, cooking, enjoying the pool, and going to the beach. They raise their own meat and laying chickens, have a vegetable garden in the summer, and live as healthy a life style as they can.

Because Catie was raised in Woodstock, she wanted to stay in the area. One day Ken was driving around in the area, spotted the house they are currently living in, and knew it was the place for them. That was seven years ago. She loves Eastford, loves how small the school is. When I asked Catie how she became involved in volunteering, she said it all started when she became involved with the Readiness Program. She was on that committee, and that led to the creation of the pre-school program that EES now has. From then on, it was warp speed for Catie. She has received nothing but support from principal Linda Loretz and from the teachers.

Then I asked Catie how others in town could become involved in volunteering. She said that there are so many ways to become involved in the community. "Come to events, enjoy the events, and maybe you'll participate the next time. Whatever you give to the town, your town will give back ten-fold. Volunteering uplifts you and your family. If you want to do anything in this town, you can do it because everyone will come together to make it happen. There's a lot of 'yes' people in town." Raw Apple-Turnip Salad

Raw turnips have a great crunchy, spicy taste! This salad is adaptable, expandable, fun.

Important: first prepare your favorite vinagrette-type dressing or have your favorite bottled dressing ready to pour.

Dressing:

- 2 Tbsp Lemon Juice
- 2 Tbsp Olive Oil
- 3 Tbsp Orange Juice

Sugar, Salt & Pepper to taste

1 or 2 large apples (slivered or cut into match-sticks), immediately douse with salad dressing to prevent browning

1 medium or large turnip (slivered or cut into matchsticks)

1 carrot (slivered or cut into match-sticks - can use bagged slivered carrots)

Optional: 1 bag salad greens or cole slaw

Repeat: immediately upon cutting the apple, mix it with dressing to prevent browning. Mix all ingredients together. Chill well before serving. Can be made day before. Optional additions: Dried cranberries, cherries, raisins, nuts, grapes, cherry tomatoes. Optional: just before serving, add a bag of salad greens or cole slaw to expand amount.


