

State Representative Pat Boyd (D–Brooklyn, Eastford, Pomfret, Union, Woodstock) has been appointed Chair of the CT House of Representatives' Committee on Veterans' Affairs for the 2021 legislative session which convenes January 6, 2021. As current Vice-Chair, Rep. Boyd worked to pass legislation that: granted better college access for military families stationed in Connecticut; provided additional \$500 in help with property taxes for certain disabled veterans and service member; exempted military retirement pay from the state income tax; prohibited discrimination based upon an individual's veteran status. Rep. Boyd also serves on the Children's Committee and Public Safety and Security Committee.

Tips for Today by Liz Ellsworth

Winter is cold, and it's also a good time to explore some aspects of nature you might miss in the other seasons.

Animal tracks and animal scats are much more visible on the snow's white background. Left-behind animal tracks last longer in frozen mud.

To aid in your identifying some of these, look to this handy pocket guidebook: <u>Scats and Tracks of the Northeast</u> by James C. Halfpenny and Jim Bruchac (Falcon Guides). Wild Turkey tracks are the ones I see most often.

Identifying trees via their bark is rather tricky. In winter, trees lack foliage and offer an open door to prime bark exploration. Be inspired to learn by Michael Wojtech's <u>Bark: A Field Guide to Trees of the Northeast</u>. Yellow Birch trees are easy to identify.





The EIFC wishes ALL Happy Holidays and a Happy New Year. It is our wish that 2021 will be rewarding for all. We experienced loss in our ranks, and dealing with COVID-19 is stressful. But we wear masks, wash our hands, and practice social distancing. In keeping with our Mission Statement, and the restrictions mandated by OSHA and NFPA, the EIFC has managed to respond to "911", continue training and meeting schedules without hesitation.

To the delight of children of all ages, the Company did a "drive around" town on Sunday, December 13th. Thanks to EMS Lieutenant Steve Kitson and his wife Hannah, they were able to contact Santa Claus inviting him to come and visit our town. Santa was safely driven to all points of town on Engine Tanker 171, escorted by decorated Rescue 171, Hose Tender 171 and Service 171. Everyone on our route enjoyed a personal holiday greeting from Santa. If all goes well, and Santa liked what he saw, maybe we can invite him back next Christmas and hold our Breakfast with Santa in 2021. Santa was impressed with the town support and assured us that it was fun and would return if Mrs. Claus lets him. He would do his best to put in a good word to the Easter Bunny. FIRE POLICE, EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES AND PUBLIC RELATIONS - Continued

An official "mutual aid" agreement was entered into in 1963 with the base station in Putnam. The number to call was 928-2727. In 1975, Quinebaug Valley Dispatch, located at the Danielson Police Barracks, Troop D, was formed along with the implementation of the "911" system.

To assure the safety of its members at motor vehicle accidents and fires, a Fire Police Squad was formed in 1965 and joined the Tri-County Fire Police Association. Their charge was to provide protection to members and redirect traffic when needed. Thus, began the era of "paperwork", where the DMV required blue light permits to be carried in all privately owned vehicles.

By 1975, it was apparent that the Woodstock Fair seemed likely to become an annual fundraiser. We started with popcorn, then changed to ice cream and soda. The Ladies Auxiliary became an important participant. A building was built by members of the Company for long-term use.

Fire Prevention became a major annual event. The program, aimed primarily at educating the children of the town, was started in the Eastford School. Today, members still visit the school to conduct the first mandated, annual drill for planning and student accountability. Following the drill, lower grade students are escorted to the gym to watch a video about fire safety, talk to the firemen in gear and tour the trucks. Of course, nothing is a success without the usual "bag of goodies". The Auxiliary sponsored posters created by the children for fire safety awareness for many years. The posters were then hung around the firehouse for all steak supper attendees to appreciate.

In 1972, mutual aid departments were thinking basic first aid skills, not just firefighting. The first class, sponsored by the American Red Cross, certified 27 members in the area in Basic First Aid. By 1974, it was becoming evident that there needed to be a higher level of emergency medical training, thus the formation of the Emergency Medical Service. Ashford was designated our official ambulance service. The first, formal EMT class was held in 1983.

Member Clayton Shead was synonymous with "Captain Pancake". Clayton was the guru of flipping pancakes, cooking bacon and keeping everyone in line. Breakfasts under his watch were always a success, especially Breakfast with Santa and Breakfast with the Easter Bunny. The pancake breakfasts were extended to Heritage Day.

On June 7, 1973 Eastford suffered one of the biggest structural losses in its history. Tatem Manufacturing burned, putting many people out of work. The "Mutual Aid" system was successfully used. No lives were lost and no one badly injured. Our Auxiliary went above and beyond providing food, drink and support for the days following the fire.

In 1979, the town suffered another large fire, the Ivy Glenn. The EIFC and Mutual Aid system was put to the test again. Fortunately, damage was kept to a minimum. Not only was the structure saved, but also many books, pictures and art treasures spared from destruction.

State mandated requirements were starting to infiltrate the fire service. A Class "2" driver's license was required for all members before driving a fire truck. Training was becoming mandated i.e., New Hampshire Fire School, Intermediate State Firefighting Course at Bungay Fire Brigade in Woodstock, Breathing Apparatus, Firefighting Tactics I, II, training in emergency medical services, in addition to required weekly in-house drilling and meetings. DID YOU KNOW? Eastford Historical Society

Did you know tradition claims that a small cemetery off Ashford Road is the final resting place of a murderer? Oliver Watkins, born in Ashford in 1793, strangled his sleeping wife, Roxana, on March 22, 1829 in Sterling, CT. Tried and convicted, he was sent to the gallows on August 2, 1831. It is said that thousands traveled to witness the last hanging in the county seat of Brooklyn, Connecticut. (This story was recently found in the March, 2003 Quarterly while working in the EHS archives.)
