

After the Board of Finance/Board of Selectmen met many hours for months to draft a Town Budget it was passed on June 8th. We also set the mill rate of 26.00. Therefore, a .39% tax increase for the fiscal year 0f 2021-2022 has been set.

Our Conservation and Historic Preservation Commission has worked tirelessly with Chris Bowen to

propose to you, the people, to use Open Space Funds to purchase a





conservation easement on the estate of Arlene F. Bowen. The vote passed in favor of placing an easement. The outcome of your vote will have a significant impact on the rural character, scenic value, environmental value, and economic value of our lovely Town. On June 16, 2021 the conservation easement for the estate of Arlene F. Bowen was signed and filed with the town for permanent record. After you type in an item the instructions are provided. We have a list available on our website as well. Stickers are to be affixed to windshield's lower left-hand corner. Limit: 2 cubic yards per week – roughly one level pickup load. We will be enforcing residents to comply with rules concerning the Transfer Station. Please secure rubbish pails as you travel to Transfer Station.

<u>Transfer Station Stickers</u>— Again, please visit our website for how to obtain your stickers. Once again, up to 2 stickers can be given for the cost of \$60.00 per year if both vehicles are registered to the same address.

The Town of Eastford having legally voted to lay a tax rate of 26.00 mills on the Grand List of October 1, 2020 hereby warns those persons liable for taxes to said town that said taxes become due and payable on July 1, 2021.

All Motor Vehicle taxes and all other taxes of One Hundred Dollars or less are payable in one installment, on or before August 2, 2021. August 2, 2021 postmarks are accepted as being on time. All other taxes may be paid in two installments, the second installment becoming due on January 1, 2022.

Interest will be charged from due date on any tax or part thereof not paid on or before August 2, 2021 at a rate of 1.5% per month from due date of July 1, 2021. Minimum penalty is \$2.00. All Motor Vehicle taxes not paid by August 2, 2021 will be reported as delinquent to the Motor Vehicle Department and registrations will be denied.

If you receive a tax bill from a town you did not reside in on October 1, 2020, please contact the assessor. If you do not receive a tax bill for your real estate, motor vehicle or personal property please contact my office at (860) 974-1885 Ext. 6 for a duplicate bill. Per Connecticut General Statutes, failure to receive a bill does not relieve you of obligation to pay any tax or interest that is due.


DID YOU KNOW? Eastford Historical Society

Did you know that when the Ninth Special Olympics World Games were held in New Haven on July 1-9, 1995, Eastford hosted the Egyptian athletes? The towns of Eastford, Ashford, and Willington hosted the Egyptian delegation from June 25-29. An Old-Fashioned Tri-Town Picnic was held on June 27 at the St. Phillip Center in Ashford.

Opening and closing ceremonies were held at the Yale Bowl, and more than 7,000 athletes from 143 countries from around the globe participated in the games. The Olympic Torch was lit in Athens, Greece on May 25, and taken by ship to Ellis Island. It was then carried by runners down the main streets and back roads of about 100 Connecticut communities. A large crowd assembled to watch the torch parade as it came down Route 198 and passed through Eastford, then Phoenixville, on its way to New Haven.

News and Notes from the Superintendent's Office

On June 15 we celebrated the accomplishments of the Class of 2021. We wished them all great success as they move forward on their journey of life-long learning. As 7th and 8th graders, due to the COVID 19 pandemic, this group of young people have already experienced the need to make sacrifices and accept increased responsibilities for the good of the community and the world in which they live. I was very fortunate to have shared with this class, as seventh graders, the unique overnight experience on the Conrad in Mystic Seaport. I also had the opportunity to join them on their grade 8 trips on the Connecticut River and to Mystic Seaport. While at the Seaport, they were the first students in 18 months to board the flagship Amistad to continue the discussion that they began in their social studies classrooms about the importance of equality for all people. At all times, I was impressed by their level of maturity and interest in learning more about the world around them.

Our Board of Education was very busy in June. At its regular meeting on June 10 and a special meeting on June 22, they took several actions including:

- 1. Approved submission the Primary Mental Health Grant application
- 2. Approved submission the School Safety and Security Grant application
- 3. Approved extension of the Superintendent's contract
- 4. Approved a tuition rate \$15,218 for any student outside Eastford that makes application for and is accepted to attend EES
- 5. Repealed the temporary COVID-19 policies C1 through C5 and C7 through C16 as of June 30, 2021
- 6. Extended the COVID 19 policy C6 through June 30, 2022
- 7. Authorized the Superintendent to transfer balances in the FY 2021 budget up to \$28,173.12 for the approved School Security Grant purchases and hold the amount for the kindergarten fence in the grant for possible purchase next school year
- 8. Authorized the Superintendent to make year-end transfers within the FY 2021 budget to bring all accounts into balance and purchase facilities items totaling \$13,501.18 and technology items totaling \$12,787.19
- 9. Internally encumber up to \$20,000 of the 2020-2021 budget for the Town of Eastford's Municipal Reserve Fund.
- 10. Set the salaries of non-affiliated employees according to the recommendations of the Executive Committee

Although it is summer, there is still much activity occurring at EES. Planning and preparation for the 2021-22 school year is already underway. As of June 30, the next phase of the boiler replacement/repair project will be taking place. As a result of making application for and receiving special grant funding, summer school enrichment programming will be held at EES in the month of July. Part of our summer programming is focused on STEM learning and includes an exciting partnership with Mystic Aquarium.

Although mulch and wood chips enhance the beauty of our properties, caution needs to be taken when storing and using.

Noticeably, mulch fires have become a topic of conversation and "911" calls. High temperatures, along with hot and dry conditions for an extended period of time, below average rainfall, high winds are a leading factor in their cause. Mulch and wood chips are combustible materials, continuously decompose, generate high temperatures that can lead to spontaneous combustion even without an outside source of ignition.

In accordance with NFPA 230, or local codes, to avoid a mulch and/or wood chips fire that can expose houses and vehicles, the following rules are simple:

Keep the mulch/chips moist. Piles should be separated from one another, a minimum of 15' in between. If stored, monitor the pile temperature regularly.

Spread and pile thinly. Too much piled on top of itself is more likely to combust as the core temperature easily rises. Spread or pile away from structures or vehicles. Piles should not exceed 60' high / 300' wide. Fire extinguishers suitable for Class A fires should be readily available.

In many fires, the smoldering mulch tunnels under the surface, then breaks out into open flames.

Eastford Conservation and Historic Preservation Commission Report

CONGRATULATIONS, EASTFORD!

On June 9, 2021, by unanimous vote at a Special Town Meeting, Eastford citizens approved an expenditure of \$80,000 from the Town's Open Space Fund to purchase a conservation easement on 21 acres at 170 Eastford Road. This means that, in perpetuity, the land surrounding the home that belonged to Charles and Arlene (Peg) Bowen will stay as it is, a beautiful swath of green hill above our Bowen Field.

This parcel has a number of valuable environmental assets. The Still River flows there; in addition, it lies over an important stratified drift aquifer. The land includes important and prime farm soils, and at least three species of statewide concern.

The Town's dedicated Open Space Fund exists to help preserve significant parcels, like the Bowen property, that hold particular value as they are. Of particular importance are properties that help maintain the rural and scenic character of the Town, which townspeople have underscored repeatedly in the Town's Plans of Conservation and Development. Connectivity or proximity to other protected fields and/or forests is also an important factor, for the maintenance of wildlife corridors. Fresh water aquifers, prime soils, riparian buffers to our streams and lakes, the existence of endangered species on the property, all are features to be taken into consideration.

It is good to report, too, that repeated studies have shown that Open Space saves tax-payer dollars. Houses and condominiums cost the Town more than they bring in in tax dollars, because they can require Town expenditures for schools, roads, and other services.

If you are a landowner who is interested in possible Open Space protection for your fields and/or forest land, please contact any member of the Eastford Conservation and Historic Preservation Commission. In the months ahead, we hope to hold a numbers of informational discussions for citizens who wish to learn more.
