Thanks for the overwhelming support at our Steak Supper on April 20st. Hopefully, that was the beginning of spring and the end of winter.

It is road clean-up time. Please check out your green house number signs and replace with a FREE one if needed. It is especially important to designate a second road sign if you share a common driveway. Time is of the essence when we are looking for a house off the multiple driveways.

Thank you for the checks that the department received for a "job well done". These checks are used to supplement our tight budget with gear and equipment that is needed. HOWEVER, the EIFC is still in need of volunteers to run the department and participate at calls. Checks are so appreciated, but we need people. If you want to join an organization and gain the ultimate of satisfaction to help others, second to none, get in touch with any member for information.

At a recent drill, firefighter/EMR Nick Ahnberg paid us a visit while on leave. Nick is serving his country in the U.S. Marine Corp, considered one of the most elite fighting forces in the world. We, as his home department, know that what Nick learned and practiced while a member, can only enhance his knowledge and performance in his duty to country.

To assure prompt and efficient transfer of medical information, it is critical that you create a document to let us know exactly what your health issues are, i.e., What medications do you take? What dose? What is the medication for? Any known allergies? When and if you require transport to a local hospital, this information can be hand-passed to the ambulance crew, then to the ER to assure proper care.

As you pass the firehouse on any Wednesday evening, you'll see the department outside training on various skills and techniques. Stop by and observe to see how we work and how you may be able to join and learn these skills.

To name just a few of the skills that we routinely fine-tune, they are: Ice Rescue, CPR/AED, Truck Pumps, EMS Skills, Hazmat, Ranger, Triage/Extrication, Chimney Fires, RIT, Search and Rescue, hose advancement, dry hydrant pumping, foam, etc. DO YOU LIVE ALONE? ARE YOU CONCERNED ABOUT YOUR SAFETY?

DO YOU HAVE HEALTH ISSUES? HAVE YOU CONSIDERED A MEDIC ALERT SYSTEM?

A medic alert system will provide you with the ultimate in emergency help 24/7 if you cannot call "911" on your phone. A simple touch of the system will start the process. If you wear an emergency alert bracelet or pendent at all times, and you find yourself alone in a crisis, all you have to do is push the button to get connected to help directly through the system's base.

DID YOU KNOW? "A Memorial Day History" by Eastford Historical Society

Did you know that Memorial Day was once called Decoration Day? On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, a Union Civil War Veterans organization, issued a proclamation calling for "Decoration Day" to be observed annually and nationwide. It would be a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the Civil War dead with flowers, a practice that had begun in the South three years earlier. The Civil War had claimed more lives than any conflict in United States history (620,000), and required the establishment of the country's first national cemetery. After World War I the practice was extended to honor the dead of all American Wars. Decoration Day was first celebrated on May 30, 1868, and it continued to be celebrated on May 30th until Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act in 1968. Over the years the day began to be known as Memorial Day. The Act established that "Memorial Day "would be celebrated on the last Monday of May, beginning in 1971.

A part of Eastford's Memorial Day observance includes honoring the 172 men and women buried in Eastford who served their country in the military. Volunteers place American flags in their memory in six of the town's thirteen cemeteries. Ceremonies are held at the General Lyon Cemetery at 8:30am and the Grove Cemetery at 9am to honor those who died serving their country, followed at 9:30am by a parade from EES and ceremonies at the Veterans Memorial.

The Museum of Eastford History opens for the season on Sunday, May 12 from 2-4pm. The Museum will be open on the Second and Fourth Sundays through Columbus Day Weekend. We look forward to seeing you.

News from the Principal by Carole McCombe With the flowers blooming and the weather warming up, we are trying to take advantage of the last few weeks of school. Throughout the months of May and early June, many field trips, activities and year-end culminating experiences will take place. Please carefully check for newsletters and notices home as well as information posted on our school website: <u>www.eastfordct.org</u>. This will be the first year in many that we have only had two snow days to make up. Our last day of school will be an early release day on June 12 and our eighth grade graduation will be on June 11 at 7:00PM.

Before we get to that point though, students in grades 3-8 will complete their Smarter Balanced Assessments (SBAC) in ELA and Math and students in grades 5 and 8 will also take the Next Generation Science Standards Assessment (NGSS). These newer assessments are un-timed and completed solely on computers. They are much more rigorous than our previous state assessments. Students are encouraged to come to school well rested and prepared to do their best work. Classroom teachers will provide more specific information to families regarding testing days and special schedules. Any questions regarding the assessments or testing schedule should be directed to classroom teachers.

Our Preschool and Kindergarten programs are both planning transition activities for current students and incoming students for next school year. Please check our school website for updated information regarding these events. If you have children eligible to attend either Preschool or Kindergarten and have not yet registered, please contact the school office as soon as possible so we can get necessary information out to you. News and notes from the Superintendent's Office by Dr. Donna P. Leake

At the April BOE meeting, BOE member Mr. Marmat spoke to the numerous achievements of the Eastford students at Woodstock Academy over the past few months. As I receive notice of students' achievements in academics, sports and extracurricular interests both at EES and at our high schools I continue to be impressed with the accomplishments of our students. All members of the Eastford Community should take pride in the accomplishments of our students. Their continued success is made possible by their hard work, the efforts of our dedicated staff and the willingness of community members such as the members of the BOE, school and community volunteers, and the taxpayers of Eastford that give of your time and money to support the Eastford Learning Community.

The BOE will be hosting a Staff Appreciation Breakfast on May 7th as a token of appreciation for the efforts of the great staff of EES. Therefore, I would like to take this opportunity to remind the public of the services provided to our students by our outstanding teaching staff. Leading this team of high-quality educators is our outstanding teacher-leader, Carole McCombe. It would be remiss not to also recognize that the success of our teachers is supported by a team of dedicated staff that includes paraprofessionals, office support and building support staff. As the saying goes, any system is only as good as the sum of its parts – and we are fortunate that all of our parts (at least the human ones if not the mechanical ones) are in great working order and together provide the exceptional services that contribute to the overall success of the Eastford Learning Community.

Speaking of mechanical parts, you may have heard it was a little chillier than usual Friday morning, April 5. We had some issues with our heating and water systems this month. A request for a conversion of our current steam heating system to hot water is included in the Capital Improvement Budget requests for this year.

At the Special Board of Education meeting on April 2, the BOE approved an adjusted 2019-20 budget that includes \$10,000 for a possible contribution to Teacher Retirement costs, while maintaining a 3.00% increase. A copy of this budget was sent to the First Selectmen's Office on April 8th. By the time you are reading this Communicator, the BOE will have presented its proposed budget at the Town budget hearing on April 29th.

Thanks to the efforts of our art teacher, Elizabeth O'Hara, our students participated in the Invention Convention program this year. Letters of congratulations from the BOE were sent to Johanna Blanchette (finalist), Owen Budd (finalist), and Porter Barlow (honorable mention) for their submissions to the E.E.S. Invention Convention. The finalists will attend the statewide Invention Convention at UCONN in May. At the April BOE meeting, Finalist Owen Budd and Honorable Mention recipient Porter Barlow shared their own

Inventions and provided a powerpoint presentation explaining the process of the Invention Convention. Finalist Johanna Blanchette was also recognized by the BOE but was unable to attend the meeting.

State Representative Pat Boyd attended the April meeting of the BOE and provided an update of where some issues concerning small towns and education currently stand. He reiterated that he is available to contact for information, questions or concerns.

At the BOE meeting, the last day of school was set on June 12, 2019 and graduation on June 11, 2019. Hopefully we will not have another day off from school prior to June 11. The graduation for Woodstock Academy is scheduled on Saturday, June 15 at 10:00AM. We have 16 students graduating from WA. We also have one student graduating from Ellis Technical School. Their tentative graduation date is Wednesday, June 12.

I would like to thank Carole McCombe and the members of her interview committee for their efforts in recommending Steven Guilbault for our special education position. His appointment was approved at the April BOE meeting and he will begin in August 2019.

In other BOE Business, Chris Hustus, Megan Calchera and Terry Cote were appointed to serve on the Eastford Scholarship selection committee and the BOE accepted, with regret, John Barlow's resignation from the Board of Education.

A whole bunch of famous characters were involved in somethings great under the starlit canopy of our spot in The Last Green Valley. General Nathaniel Lyon rings a bell, right? Well, after delicious lunch from Illianos, YUM, right?! Ranger Bill Reid, the seasoned resident of The Llast Green Valley and veteran of Old Sturbridge Village himself, shed some light on a few prominent names of interest for us. So did you know Samuel Webster, the father of the American Industrial Revolution came from the UK, but settled in Webster, Mass, to get things going. Hence, all those wonderful textile mills up along the Riverside pumping out all kinds of cotton thread and millwork cemented his spot in American History. Prudence Crandall of Canterbury started the first Academy for Black Women. Report of the Union Society Building Committee

On May 7, 2019, volunteer painter Tony Casarella of Ashford joined representative of Benjamin Moore to test paints at the Union Society Building. Mr. Casarella and his volunteers have offered to paint two walls of the building without charge, and Benjamin Moore has offered to donate paints. This effort was coordinated by Mr. Casarella and Herman Barlow of Mansfield Supply, and we are grateful for these in-kind donations.

The USBC met on May 8 and Architect Robert Hurd of The Architects in Hartford brought plans and specifications for repairs to the northeast upper corner of the east wall (facing Rt. 198). With approval of the BOS on May 8, Architect Hurd began the bidding process for the repairs on May 10 with email and mailed invitations to bid, which will be followed by a walk -through on May 15 and subsequent review of bids to assure financial stability of contractors along with proof of previous experience with U.S. Department of Interior standards for historic repairs. Funding is provided by grants from the State of Connecticut, The Last Green Valley and private donations made to the Town of Eastford/Union Society Fund.

The 1806 Union Society of Phoenixville House is owned by the Town of Eastford. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places because for nearly 200 years it hosted gatherings that included tax protests for people who wanted to vote, classes to teach children to read, 4-H and Boy Scout meetings, Sunday School, potlucks for fun, funerals and dances, oyster suppers to raise funds for the Eastford Independent Fire Co. No. 1, and other events.

Eastford's Union Society Building is one of only two Union Society buildings still standing in Connecticut. At the Union Society, all were welcome regardless of ethnic background, age, gender or spiritual belief. Rehabilitation of the building will provide a meeting space for Eastford organizations.

The training session will be co-hosted by the Congregational Church of Eastford and Eastford Emergency Management and will be held at the Congregational Church, 8 Church Road on Monday May 13th, 2019 from 700 PM-930 PM.

The session is open to the public at no charge. Amateur Radio Operators, emergency managers, police, fire, and other first responders are encouraged to attend. Everyone age 16 and older who stays to complete the training will be able to become trained NWS weather spotters.

The training session includes a two-hour and thirty-minute computer-based presentation, which discusses the development of thunderstorms, the criteria for "severe" thunderstorms, as well as the cloud features associated with severe thunderstorms and tornados. Additional information will be presented about winter storms and proper snow measurement and reporting of coastal flooding, river, stream, and urban flooding and rainfall measurements. The session will also present the procedure for reporting weather information to the National Weather Service. Safety procedures for the various forms of summer severe weather (severe thunderstorms, tornadoes and lightning), winter storms, and flooding will also be covered in the training session. Anyone attending should bring a pen or pencil and bringing a notebook is optional.
