News You Can Use by Deb Richards, Emergency Preparedness Directdor Prepare a Pet Emergency Supply Kit

Just as you do with your family's emergency supply kit, think first about the basics for you pet's survival, particularly food and water. Consider two kits. In one, put everything you and your pets will need to stay where you are. The other should be a lightweight, smaller version you can take with you if you and your pets have to get away. Plus, be sure to review your kits regularly to ensure that their contents, especially foods and medicines, are fresh.

Food. Keep at least three days of food in an airtight, waterproof container. **Water.** Store at least three days of water specifically for your pets in addition to water you need for yourself and your family.

Medicines and medical records. Keep an extra supply of medicines your pet takes on a regular basis in a waterproof container.

First aid kit. Most kits should include cotton bandage rolls, bandage tape and scissors; antibiotic ointment; flea and tick prevention; latex gloves, isopropyl alcohol and saline solution.

Collar with ID tag, harness or leash. Your pet should wear a collar with its rabies tag and identification at all times. Include a backup leash, collar and ID tag in your pet's emergency supply kit. In addition, place copies of your pet's registration information, adoption papers, vaccination documents and medical records in a clean plastic bag or waterproof container and add them to your kit. You should also consider talking with your veterinarian about permanent identification such as microchipping.

Crate or other pet carrier. If you need to evacuate in an emergency situation take your pets and animals with you provided that it is practical to do so. In many cases, your ability to do so will be aided by having a sturdy, safe, comfortable crate or carrier ready for transporting your pet.

Sanitation. Include pet litter and litter box if appropriate, newspapers, paper towels, plastic trash bags and household chlorine bleach to provide for your pet's sanitation needs. You can use bleach as a disinfectant (dilute nine parts water to one part bleach), or in an emergency you can also use it to purify water. Use 16 drops of regular household liquid bleach per gallon of water. Do not use scented or color safe bleaches, or those with added cleaners.

A picture of you and your pet together. If you become separated from your pet during an emergency, a picture of you and your pet together will help you document ownership and allow others to assist you in identifying your pet. Include detailed information about species, breed, age, sex, color and distinguishing characteristics. Familiar items. Put favorite toys, treats or bedding in your kit. Familiar items can help reduce stress for your pet.

EES Teacher Report Rain, Rain, Go Away . . . No, Wait. No Problem!

Come rain or come shine, the gardens at Eastford Elementary School are set to thrive this spring, thanks to the addition of a rain garden on the property. According to the Environmental Protection Agency website, a rain garden is "a depressed area in the landscape that collects rain water from a roof, driveway or street and allows it to soak into the ground. Planted with grasses and flowering perennials, rain gardens can be a cost effective and beautiful way to reduce runoff from your property."

Mr. Dan Mullins, the Executive Director of the Eastern Connecticut Conservation District in Norwich brought several varieties of perennials for the rain garden. The plants include Phlox subulata (commonly called moss phlox or creeping phlox), Tiarella cordifolia (commonly called the heart-leafed foam flower), Monarda didyma (a mint relative commonly called bee balm), Asclepias tuberosa (a species of milkweed, commonly called butterfly weed), and Echinacea purpurea (commonly called the purple coneflower). The rain garden is located in the lowest spot on the property, coincidently right outside of the science classroom window. Runoff water from the parking lot during a rainstorm and melting snow banks from the edge of the parking lot in the spring will help nourish the garden. Also, a rain barrel with a diverter from the gutter will collect water from the roof of the original building for the garden. The students will care for the plants in the fall and spring, and the blossoms will help the bees and other wildlife like the pollinator garden above the parking lot currently does. The rain garden was made possible with support from the town's selectmen and the help of town employees. Thanks to Mr. Roy for excavating the hole. 

In addition to the beautiful autumn leaves, fall brings with it a chill in the air. The good news is that the HEAT IS ON at EES! Our heating repair is complete. On October 15, the Town Building Committee will meet to review the bid proposal and next steps for the steam to hot water heat conversion project.

The BOE took the following actions at the October 10th meeting:

- -Approved Policy 3150, Board Budget Procedures and Line Item Transfers.
- -Approved Policy 5145, Application of Sunscreen.
- -Approved the 2020 Board of Education meeting dates.
- -Approved the requests from Union students to participate in our sports program.
- -Approved the appointment of Joseph Tomanelli as our new Music Teacher and David Vaughan as our new Instrumental Teacher. We are fortunate and very delighted to have these accomplished teachers and professional musicians join our staff.

Regionalization/ regional efforts:

On September 26, I, along with Superintendents and BOE members from other area districts, attended a meeting at EASTCONN arranged by State Representative Doug Dubitsky and Pat Boyd, our State Representative. Representative Dubitsky reviewed the legislation that was presented last year regarding regionalization. Although that legislation did not pass, Representative Dubitsky believes that legislation to force the regionalization of small districts will appear again in the next legislative session. He wants us to be prepared and proactive in addressing such legislation. A meeting to continue the discussion is set for November 21st at 5:30pm.

The Volunteer Spirit is ALIVE at EES!

We depend on and appreciate the ongoing volunteer efforts of family and community members who give generously of their time to support the EES community. Members of the Conservation Commission recently installed a rain garden at our school. Tom DeJohn, a member of the Conservation Commission, is working with two Eagle Scouts, Tristan Monahan and Sam Massey, to complete projects that are underway at the Askew Trail behind the school. In October I had the chance to observe community volunteers make Zentangle pumpkins and rockets with our students. In addition to watching students design their pumpkins, I was presented with a Zentangle pumpkin of my very own. 

With the culmination of months of study and classroom participation, Steve has been certified by the State of Connecticut and Nationally, our latest EMT – Emergency Medical Technician. Steve will play a vital role with his credentials in responding to medical emergencies. He is also a firefighter. Congrats Steve!!!!!

The Company responded to 18 emergencies for service in September. Along with the "911" calls, we contributed our time with the monthly business meeting, three drills, and line officers meeting.

On Saturday, October 12th, the firehouse was open to all residents to tour our house, view apparatus and equipment, inquire about becoming a member, goodies for the children and refreshments.

All residents received a letter from the Recruitment Committee in their mailboxes detailing our need for new members and our desire to maintain our volunteer status. Members are always willing to speak to you at our Wednesday drill nights from 6:30 to 7:00, or simply call 860-974-0630, leave a message, and an officer will call you back as soon as possible. During that time, you can pick up new or freshen your green house number signs.

Saturday, October 19th, was our fall "All You Can Eat" Steak Supper. As always, the supper was a sell-out, supplementing our budget. But more important was the "getting together" for good food and public relations. Our second supper of the season with be in April, 2020. Thank you for the support we received with ticket sales.

October and Fire Prevention are synonymous. It is critical that we all think ahead to fire safety, evacuation of houses and apartments, and the "meeting place". A good rule to follow is when the time changes, test your detectors, replace the batteries, and change your clocks. Repeat the process again in the spring. Winter is just around the corner with snow, ice and cold temperatures. Fire prevention and safety thoughts we must all consider are:

- -It is no surprise there are more home fires in the winter months than any other season. People are heating their homes during the winter and heating is the second leading cause of home fire. Heating equipment is involved in 1 in every 7 reported home fires and 1 in every 5 home fire deaths.
- -The use of fireplaces and woodstoves are more popular as a heating source. There are chimney cleaning services out there that will help to keep you safe. Do not try to clean the chimney yourselves. A HUGE hazard for chimney/stove fires is the disposal of the ashes. Plastic pails and wooden boxes will melt and begin a fire. Use a metal pail, and dispose of the ashes away from the house. Ashes can smolder for weeks and spontaneously start a fire. Chimney fires start in the chimney, there is an explicit, audible sound of fire, that can quickly spread to the rest of the house if not observed.
- -Cooking is, by far, the leading cause of home fires and injuries.
- -Have you considered purchasing and installing "talking" smoke/fire detectors? A new study shows that maternal voice smoke alarms are more effective in waking children than conventional tone alarms.
- -Each day on the news there are reports of home fire fatalities. These early reports provide only basic information about what happened, such as how many fatalities, when and where the fire happened, and the type of home, apartment or mobile home. Most fires require investigations that can take weeks or months to complete, but press never make a follow-up broadcast to inform the communities the "cause". Conduct your own investigation as to the potential cause.

JOIN THE FIGHT!! - Fire is everyone's fight to unite the fire service, life safety organizations and professionals in an effort to reduce home fire injuries, deaths and property loss. The goal is to change how people think about fire and fire prevention.

FIRE SAFETY OUICK TIPS:

Stay in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food.

Keep space heaters 3 feet from anything that can burn.

Inspect electrical cords and replace or repair loose or damaged cords.

Extinguish candles when leaving the room or going to sleep.

Prepare and practice a home fire escape plan.

Install smoke alarms – test monthly – change batteries when you change the clocks.

REMEMBER: CARBON MONOXIDE IS THE "SILENT KILLER" The colorless, odorless and tasteless gas is a byproduct of burning organic fuels., i.e., household appliances and equipment fueled with gas, oils, coal, kerosene or wood. Examples are furnaces, water heaters, space heaters, cars, charcoal grills, lanterns, clothes dryers, ovens, fireplaces, lawn mowers, snow blowers, etc. Early symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning often mimic the flu – headache, nausea, unclear thinking, shortness of breath, weakness and loss of muscle control. Severe symptoms can lead to convulsions, unconsciousness and possible death. If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning, leave your home right away, do not open windows or doors and call 911 for your local fire department to respond and test for the source of the carbon monoxide exposure. **A FEW RESPONSIBLE, COMMON SENSE PRECAUTIONS WILL KEEP EVERYONE SAFE.**

DID YOU KNOW? by Eastford Historical Society

Did you know that a woman who lived in Eastford was once the oldest woman in our state? Her name was Sarah Bosworth Bradway. When she passed on October 20, 1926, she was 108 years, 5 months and 20 days old. She was born on April 30, 1818. In her later years she lived with her daughter Mrs. Mary Clark, in the house that was recently dismantled on Pork Hill (Old Colony Road). She died in that house and her funeral service was conducted there as well. She is buried in the Grove Cemetery. Sarah was a Real Daugther of the American Revolution and a lifelong resident of Eastford. She seldom left town and had never ridden on a railroad car, trolley car, or in an automobile. It is said that "she never had a window open, never sat out of doors, ate whatever appealed to her taste, and continued to do this until her end." She had five children, but only two survived her: Mrs. A. M. (Emma) Bowen and Mrs. Darwin (Mary) Clark. She also left 13 grandchildren, 15 great-grandchildren, and six great-greatgrandchildren who acted as her pall bearers. Today, many of Sarah's descendents live in Eastford and surrounding towns. Taken from an article written by A. M. Bowen, Mrs. Bradways sonin-law. Note: A Real Daughter of the American Revolution is one who's father served in the Revolution.

Eastford's 1806 Union Society Building By Carol Davidge, Chair Current repairs to the Union Society Building are funded entirely by grants from The Last Green Valley, the State of Connecticut's Department of Economic and Community Development, the Rotary Club of Putnam, and donations from individuals to the Town's Union Society Fund. The historic 1806 Union Society building hosted celebrations, putluck dinners, oyster supper fundraisers for the Eastford Volunteer Fire Co, No. 1. and provided gifts to needy during the holidays. Many of the children who received gifts anonymously would not have had presents at Christmas. This building was a gathering place in Phoenixville for some 200 years. All were welcome regardless of ethnic origin, spiritual belief, gender or age. Union Societies helped children learn to read. Early in the 1800s, union societies protested to Hartford to gain the vote at a time when only male members of the Congregational Church could vote. It is one of only two Union Society buildings still standing in Connecticut. It is owned by the Town of Eastford. Donations are needed to restore the building so it can again be used as a public gathering place. Donations and Legacy Memorials are needed to move the project forward. For donations of \$100 or more, a plaque acknowledges the donor and individuals being honored. All proceeds from fundraisers go to the Town of Eastford for rehabilitation of the building. 
