

News and Notes from the Superintendent...Donna P. Leake



As your Superintendent, much of my time is spent managing the daily operation of the district. This includes attending to ongoing facility issues, overseeing personnel matters, managing the budget, and guiding the implementation of policies to provide a safe and secure educational environment for Eastford staff, students, and their families. The primary reason I am an educator is because I care about the well-being of young people. So, in addition to providing an optimum environment for them to learn, my greatest joy is spending time with them. On November 4, I took advantage of the opportunity to join grade 5 and 6 students during their team-building field trip to Mystic Seaport (photo left). It was amazing to watch the positive ways they interacted with each other to accomplish group tasks. Our Board has been busy this fall. The

Facilities Committee has been overseeing the successful completion of the roof and insulation project; the Curriculum Committee reviewed and recommended the addition of two new novels to the BOE student book list; and the Policy Committee diligently continues its task of updating the 5000 series policies while attending to new policies required by the recent changes in legislation. Included among the actions of the whole BOE are: Approval of Title I, Title II, and Title IV Grant submissions; approval of the School Safety & Security Plan for submis-




sion to the State; approval of the 2022-23 Flexibilities option for teacher evaluation; accepting the Annual Report for School Year 2021-2022; establishing their Leadership Goals for 2022-2023; setting the 2023 Board of Education Meeting Dates (posted on the BOE website: <u>www.eastfordct.org</u>). With budget season fast approaching, the BOE also approved the Finance Committee meeting dates. On December 8 at 5:30PM, members of the Eastford Community are welcomed and encouraged to share their thoughts and opinions regarding the 2023-2024 BOE budget. Administrative recommendations and public input provide important guidance for the Board as they begin their formal deliberations at their budget workshops scheduled for January 12, January 19, and February 2 at 6:00PM. The BOE anticipates approval of its 2023-2024 BOE budget at its February 9 regular meeting. In closing, in this season of thanksgiving, I would like to thank the residents of Eastford for their incredible support of the education of all Eastford students and for providing me the wonderful opportunity to serve the students, families and the staff of the Eastford School District. Eastford Recycling: First in a Series by David M. Jakubowski, Sr., Chair, Eastford Transfer Station Commission & Eastford Conservation & Historic Preservation Commission

Working together, the residents of Eastford can control or reduce the trash hauling costs for the Town and, at the same time, help conserve the environment.

We may not be aware that if we put the wrong materials in the wrong collection container at the Eastford Transfer Station, the entire load of recyclables could become contaminated/unusable and result in the Town having to pay additional fees to the trash hauling company.

Paper/Cardboard Recycling

The Town of Eastford has a dedicated compactor for paper and cardboard.

The Town pays a fee to haul the Paper/Cardboard compactor to the regional recycling center each time it gets full **BUT** Eastford is <u>not</u> charged for disposal of the paper and cardboard in that compactor.

This is in contrast to the Household Waste compactor where the Town pays a haul charge <u>PLUS</u> an additional fee for every pound of waste in the compactor.

Thus, there is economic incentive to put paper and cardboard waste into the recycling compactor instead of the Household Waste compactor.

What can go into the Paper/Cardboard compactor?

The following items <u>CAN</u> go into the Paper/Cardboard compactor: Cardboard (<u>please</u> break down boxes), paper, newspaper, magazines, junk mail, egg cartons, paper towel rolls, manilla folders, clean empty food boxes, clean pizza boxes.

The follow items <u>CAN</u> <u>NOT</u> go into the Paper/Cardboard compactor: no Tyvek shipping envelopes, no plastic mailing envelopes, no packing peanuts, no Styrofoam, no plastic bags, no shredded paper (it clogs the sorting equipment that sorts the recyclable materials), no tissue paper.



Tips for Today by Liz Ellsworth Happy Holidays! It is important to have plants in your yard that encourage local bird populations, and other pollinators, like bees, bats, and butterflies. You'll bring more birds and pollinators to your yard with native plants, and ensure thriving populations. Pollinators pollinate crops like apples, peaches, coffee, blueberries, almonds, melon, strawberries, bananas, potatoes, and chocolate. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, "native plants are considered the best choice because of their abundance of nectar and pollen in addition to being low maintenance, generally pest free, drought tolerant, and ability to control erosion. They are good sources of food and shelter for wildlife, and naturally beautiful." Give some native plants to family and friends this holiday season. To find the right kind for those out-of-state, you can search via zip code. For birds, explore the National Audubon Society's website: www.audubon.org/native-plants. For bees, butterflies, and moths, investigate the resources found on the Xerces Society's website: https://xerces.org/pollinator-conservation/pollinator-friendly-plantlists. You can always give a gift certificate to a favorite local florist or garden store. Or create a raincheck coupon gift, and offer to help with planting in the spring. October was another busy month for the EIFC. There were 17 "911" calls in September. 17 calls in October.

Welcome to Anthony Volpe as a probation member. Anthony comes to us with credentials and will be participating on the firefighter and EMT levels.

Congratulations to Chief Doug Beaudoin and member Tony Greer for successfully completing 40 hours of mandatory classroom and skills to renew their EMT certifications, which is required every two years.

October was Fire Prevention Month. 0n 10/8, members brought trucks down to the Library for "Touch a Truck".

10/14, members participated in a mandatory "drill" that included evacuation of the Eastford School when the alarm was sounded. Members found the source of the alarm and disengaged it. Outside, students gathered with their classes behind the school for accountability. The school was totally evacuated in 3 minutes at the September drill and a little over 2 minutes during the October drill. OUTSTANDING! Following the outside evacuation, the lower grades congregated in the gym to watched a video – "Sparky and the Runaway Robot". Members wore their turn-out gear, crawled on the floor for kids to touch and learned about what the special gear does for the firefighter. Then the students went outside to view and climb in an out of the trucks. "Goodies" were given to the kids.

10/18 - Deputy Chief Roy and member Bertram returned to the school to speak to grades 4 through 8 about fire safety, evacuation, and designating a place to congregate.

10/21 – Captain Nate Fabian and members Zac Bertram and Jeannine Spink welcomed the kindergarten grades to the station to view the trucks, talk about fire safety and give goodies.

10/30 – Buell's Orchard for "Trunk or Treat" was without question, the best event ever. Over 400 children, with parents, grand-parents, and 3 dogs were dressed in costume to get candy. The EIFC contributed by displaying the Engine Tanker 271, letting the kids see the compartments and of course, more candy.

10/31 – "Trunk or Treat" – We brought ET171 and ET271 to the school parking lot for a town-wide event. Thank you to Eastford for supporting our efforts to give our children a fun and SAFE event.

Drills for October included ladders and spinal immobilation/backboards, in addition to the monthly business meeting, truck checks and Line Officers meeting. Thanks for the generous donations received in memory of Richard Cooley.

The Company received a DEEP Matching Grant to purchase a Ready Rack Gear System.

Our clocks have been changed back one hour. Time to check and replace the batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
